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
It's Rubio vs. America! Committee Battles Prominent Senator

LeBlanc Demands End to Marketing of Welfare to Immigrants

"The law is crystal clear on the fact that U.S. law forbids admission to any immigrant who is likely to depend on public assistance. It appears in the Immigration and Nationality Act, first passed in the 1950s and still the law of the land today," said National Spokesman Steve LeBlanc.

According to Section 212(a)

(4), "Any alien who, in the opinion of the consular officer at the time of application for a visa, or in the opinion of the Attorney General at the time of application for admission or adjustment of status, is likely at any time to become a public charge is inadmissible."

This clearly written public law

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SNEAK OF THE MONTH:

Tucson Sector Border Patrol Management

The Center for Investigative Reporting received data on apprehensions of men, women and children by the Border Patrol last fiscal year through a Freedom of Information Act. The data show that most are from Mexico, although thousands also come from other Central American countries. Despite the efforts by the Border Patrol, the same agents see repeat offenders again and again.

One such effort to halt this revolving door — which costs the taxpayers and border states significantly — is Operation Streamline.

Operation Streamline pushes criminal penalties as a deterrence to illegal immigration.

- In 2012, out of 364,768 apprehensions by the U.S. Border Patrol, 100,735 already had been nabbed at least two times.
- Also in 2012, 21,694 border crossers had been caught six or more times trying to gain illegal entry to the United States.

These numbers are staggering. But what we find interesting is how two neighboring border patrol sectors can have such different prosecution rates.

The Del Rio Border Patrol Sector of Texas saw 67% of its nearly 22,000 apprehended referred for prosecution.

In sharp contrast, the Tucson

Border Patrol Section only referred 23% of their 120,000 apprehensions for prosecution.

The Del Rio sector lies along the 210 miles of the Rio Grande River that forms the border between the U.S. and Mexico and inland hundreds of miles.

The Tucson sector is the busiest sector on the Southwest Border covering 262 miles of linear border from the Yuma county line to the Arizona/New Mexico state line.

But clearly criminal penalties won't deter someone from crossing illegally if they aren't being prosecuted for trying. Shame on Tucson sector management for not using the tools at their disposal.

Sen. Rubio, a shining star of the Republican party, is a member of the bipartisan group of senators known as the “Gang of Eight” that continues to champion passage of this amnesty deal. The other seven ring leaders of this effort are Senators Michael Bennet (D-CO), Richard Durbin (D-IL), Jeff Flake (R-AZ), Lindsey Graham (R-SC), Robert Menendez (D-NJ), John McCain (R-AZ), and Charles Schumer (D-NY).

The 844-page bill received harsh criticism, even from pro-amnesty forces. Here are a just a few of the hard to swallow bits included in the Gang of Eight legislation.

- Page 87: Allows illegal aliens with amnesty “provisional” status to work in the U.S.

and travel outside of the U.S. without obtaining a visa.

- Page 102: Lets Secretary of Homeland Security waive employment and education requirements for illegal aliens.
- Page 102: Grants Secretary of Homeland Security authority to waive work requirements for “provisional” status illegals to gain permanent residence.
- Page 131: Allows the Secretary to give \$50,000,000 in grants to assist illegal immigrants in citizenship applications.
- Page 380: The Secretary, acting through the Director of U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services, is directed

to establish a nonprofit known as the “United States Citizenship Foundation” to provide direct assistance for aliens seeking “provisional” immigrant status, legal permanent resident status, or naturalization as a United States citizen.

- Page 606: Lets gang members become citizens as long as they swear off their gang affiliation.

“These are just a few examples of the dangers to national security buried deep in this bill,” said National Spokesman Steve LeBlanc. “Make no mistake: this is war against our people, our way of life, and our future. We must stop this bill.”

is disregarded seemingly at will by those opposed to it.

Across the nation, groups like the Arizona Department of Economic Security and the International Rescue Committee (IRC) give classes to recently-arrived refugees as well as illegal immigrants to learn how to receive food stamps, and counsels them through the immigration and naturalization process to become U.S. citizens. IRC receives federal funding though it is classified as a non-profit humanitarian aid organization.

In spite of the law’s plain language, the Obama Administration — like Bush before — has

continued to promote the use of food stamps and other welfare programs among newly arrived immigrants.

“They are quick to point out that they only advocate it for those with legal status, since federal benefits to illegal immigrants is expressly forbidden,” said LeBlanc. “But in an effort to push their political agenda, they are still violating the Immigration and Nationality Act.

“Sadly, this isn’t a new tactic. Back in 2004 in the Bush White House, the federal government started an initiative with the Mexican government to encourage Mexican nationals to sign up

for federal government assistance as soon as they arrived in America,” said LeBlanc.

According to a column by-journalist Byron York in the *Examiner* newspaper, “The Obama administration forbids American consular officers from even considering whether a prospective immigrant might end up on dozens of public assistance programs when evaluating that immigrant’s admissibility to the U.S.”

The U.S. Border Security Council demands that this flagrant breaking of our nation’s laws come to an end.

Border Security News in Brief

A Sneak Peak at Representative John Carter's Comprehensive Immigration Bill

While attending a meeting in his Texas Congressional District in May, U.S. Representative John Carter (R-TX) offered a select group of business leaders a peek behind the curtain at a new U.S. House of Representatives immigration reform bill.

Rep. Carter bragged to the Leander Chamber of Commerce business leaders that he has been meeting — in secret until recently — over the past four years with a bipartisan group of U.S. House officials to create comprehensive immigration legislation.

Rep. Carter serves on the prestigious House Appropriations Committee and sits on three very active and important subcommittees: Military Construction and Veterans Affairs; Transportation; and Homeland Security.

While Rep. Carter did not release specific details of the plan, he

did acknowledge that the proposed reform would include a 14-year window before legal immigrants could be eligible for citizenship, and they would be required to learn English. Rep. Carter said he would not support any amnesty for illegal immigrants or allow immediate citizenship for incoming immigrants. He feels as though comprehensive immigration reform is desperately needed, especially in Texas, because it costs too much to thwart criminals who are here illegally.

The bill should be introduced formally later this year.

DHS Border Crossing Fee Study Still Alive; Remains Controversial in Border States

Although border crossing fees may not have survived the initial markup in the Senate immigration reform bill, S. 744, a recent *Fox News Latino* report indicates that officials at the Department of Homeland Security continue to study the effect of a fee at the nation's land border crossings.

Lawmakers and citizens along the southern and northern border are split on the proposed fee, unsure about what the monies collected would do and what special interests would be exempt from the regulation.

Drug Cartels Increase Extortion

There has been a huge increase in the number of businesses reporting extortion attempts by drug cartels in Mexico, according to a survey by the American Chamber in Mexico. The survey of 541 members showed the percentage of firms reporting cartel extortions has doubled from 18% in 2012 to 36% in 2013.


Q: Which of these would you prefer - (to have Congress enact stricter border control now), (to have Congress enact a path to legal status now), to do both now, or not to do either?
